

# **Course Description**

This course is designed to give an overview of the major events, doctrines, and people that influenced Christianity from the beginning of the church (AD 30) to the end of the Twentieth Century. Special attention will be given to how God's work in the past has affected the beliefs and behaviour of Christians in the present.

# **Learning Objectives**

By the end of this course, each student should be able to:

- Be prepared to start class at 7:00 sharp each evening.
- Bring your Bible and textbook.
- Textbook reading is not required before the course begins but it will greatly improve the student's understanding of the lectures and enhance class discussion.
- By the end of this course, each student should have a greater knowledge of the major events and personalities of church history and how they influence Christianity in the present.

## **Course Activities**

# **Reading Assignments**

Complete the reading guides for the assigned chapters of the text. (Chapters 3-7, 9-28, 30-36, 38, 40-45) There are ten reading guides; each is worth 3% of the final grade. Reading guides are due at the time of the final exam in October.

## **Timeline Project**

Produce a timeline that covers the most important events and personalities of the 20 centuries of church history. Include at least 50 events/personalities but no more than 60. The timeline may be handwritten but should be neat, clear, and legible. This project is due at the time of the final exam in October.

### **Biographical Sketch Presentation**

Give a 15-minute presentation to the class about a person from church history and how that life affects or inspires us today. Include at least one quotation from Scripture. This presentation should be appropriate for a Sunday school class for children, teens, or adults. A one-page outline is due at the time of presentation. A detailed outline or manuscript is not required, but it is highly recommended. The presentation will take place sometime in October at a time that accommodates all credit students.

#### **Final Exam**

The final exam will test the student's grasp of the content discussed in class (not content from the textbook). A review sheet will be provided by the instructor to help the student prepare for the final exam. The exam will be written sometime in October at a time that accommodates all credit students.
